

With nearly 8 billion gallons of water, Carsington Water is the ninth largest reservoir in England! With open waters, muddy shorelines and native woodland, it is home to a wide variety of birds – including waterfowl, waders and raptors, making it a fantastic location for winter birdwatching.

Pennington Flash - 5th November



12 members travelled the short distance to Pennington Flash on a dry, cloudy day.

Car Park

Close to the shore, several species were ticked: Canada goose, black-headed gull, moorhen, coot, mute swan and mallard. Part way across the water, we spotted lesser black -backed gulls, great black-backed gulls, a female goldeneye and a great crested grebe. Several cormorants were on the water towards The Spit. A 'white blob', which revealed itself to be a great egret was resting on the far bank.

Pengy's Hide

A short walk brought us to the small Pengy's Hide, overlooking Pengy's Pond. There were small numbers of gadwall and tufted duck. A grey heron stood hunched at the edge of the pond.

Bunting Hide

Another short walk brought us to the Bunting Hide, with its many feeding stations. Many grey squirrels were munching the mixed seed on the tree stumps. A sparrowhawk flew through, which scattered the birds. It was quiet for about 10 minutes, after which the birds started to return. Close views were had of willow tit (2), nuthatch (2), bullfinch (male and female) and coal tit on the tree-stump feeders. In the trees at the back of the feeding arena, and on the ground, blue tit, great tit, chaffinch (male and female), blackbird, robin, dunnock and moorhen were seen.

Charlie Owen Hide

At the Charlie Owen Hide (named after a founding member of Leigh Ornithological Society), overlooking Teal Scrape, we added teal (obviously), goosander (2 females), little grebe (2) and a wren working its way through the vegetation in front of the hide.

As we walked further along the path, a small flock of long-tailed tits moved through. Around 15 goldfinches were spotted feeding at the top of some birch and willow trees. As we turned towards the Leeds Liverpool Canal, one memberr heard a water rail. A kestrel (female/juvenile) was perched near the top of a tree, and a single redwing landed in a higher tree behind the kestrel. A jay flew over.

Ramsdale Hide

We stopped for lunch at the spacious Ramsdale Hide, overlooking Fox Scape. The leader failed to follow his own instructions to bring lunch, so had to hare back to the car to collect it! From the hide we watched little egrets (4), gadwall, teal, shoveler, great crested grebe (3) and a grey heron.

Pennington Flash (continued)

Tom Edmondson Hide

A little further along the path, we came to the Tom Edmondson Hide. A great egret was showing well for a few minutes before it walked sedately out of view. Little egrets (2) were busy feeding. A few gadwall and teal were on the water, and there were glimpses of a bullfinch (male) low down in the vegetation.

Horrocks Hide

Lapwing (20), cormorant (50), a few herring gulls and a single oystercatcher were resting on The Spit. Earlier in the day, one member had seen a kingfisher. A common gull perched on a buoy. We had difficulty deciding whether another gull perched on a buoy was lesser black-backed or great black-backed. We couldn't even agree on whether its legs were pink or yellow. We did agree that gulls are tricky!

We gathered for a hot drink and a natter in the wildlife-themed lakeside café called The Hide Coffee House, before setting off home.
